# COMMONWEALTH TRANSPORTATION FUND REVENUE REPORT March 2025

#### Summary

Commonwealth Transportation Fund (CTF) revenues increased by 25.0 percent (\$93.8 million) in March. This growth is primarily attributable to a transfer timing issue adding a payment of \$66.2 million of motor fuels tax collections to March's total collections which was meant to be attributed to February.

#### Motor Fuels Tax

Motor fuels taxes increased by 73.1 percent in March primarily due to the additional transfer from February discussed above. Real average price of a gallon of regular fuel decreased to \$3.10 from February, bringing the first quarter average price to \$3.10, 10 cents lower than the forecasted average for 2025.

Due to escalating trade tensions, the continued war in Ukraine, and conflicts in the Middle East crude oil prices are likely to continue being volatile. This is likely to continue until there is more certainty about how the U.S. will conduct trade with our trading partners and when relative stability can return to oil-producing regions.

#### Motor Vehicle Sales and Use Tax

Motor vehicle sales tax collections increased by 7.9 percent in March.

U.S. light vehicle sales surged to a seasonally adjusted annualized rate of 17.77 million units in March 2025, the highest level since March 2021 and well above the combined January-February total of 15.8 million. Buyers rushed to dealerships to get ahead of potential price hikes, while automakers accelerated fleet deliveries in anticipation of impending tariffs on automobiles and their parts.

New cars sales experienced significant growth in March of 17.2 percent month-overmonth compared to February and are up 11.9 percent year-over-year from last March. Used cars sales increased by 9.4 percent from February, and 12.2 percent over last year. March is historically the strongest month for used car sales, but with the added factors of refunds arriving and the threat of 25 percent tariffs looming, many buyers decided to make their purchases this month.

Looking ahead, regardless of any tariff-related impacts, March's strong performance is expected to dampen sales in the second quarter due to further depletion of dealer inventories, which were already lean by industry standards before the month began.

Nearly 300,000 electric vehicles were sold during the first quarter of 2025, which in an increase of 11.4 percent over first quarter of last year. The rest of 2025 will likely be a volatile one for EV sales in the U.S., despite the introduction of new product and healthy incentives. If the new auto tariffs hold, they will pose a monumental challenge for many automakers, particularly due to the tariffs on steel and, importantly for EVs, aluminum. Roughly two-thirds of the EVs sold in the U.S. last year were assembled in the U.S., but like all modern automobiles, the required parts and components are sourced from around the globe.

#### State Retail Sales Tax

The transportation portion of the state retail sales tax declined by 2.9 percent in March.

#### Motor Vehicle Licenses

Motor vehicle registration fee collections were up 24.2 percent in March.
